2.1 NHS England Safeguarding app

The NHS Safeguarding app continues to support frontline staff and citizens with 24-hour, mobile access to up to date safeguarding guidance and local contacts to report safeguarding concerns.



It is accessed by over 300 users daily and has had over 61,000 downloads.

It provides an overview of necessary legislation and guidance covering both children and adults safeguarding as well as an NHS staff guide and contains regional contact information on how to report a safeguarding concern, as well as links to national bodies and for healthcare staff to have a one stop sign posting and safeguarding information.

5.0 Looked After Children

Who is a Looked after Child?

A child who has been in the care of their local authority for more than 24 hours is known as a looked after child. Looked after children are often referred to as children in care.

A child stops being looked after when they are adopted, return home or turn 18. However local authorities are required to support children leaving care at 18 until they are at least 21. This may involve them continuing to live with their foster family.

Where are looked after children placed?

Looked after children are usually living with foster parents, in a residential children's home or in residential settings like schools or secure units.

Only 29% of placements are long term and 50% of long-term teenage placements break down. There were 78,150 Looked after Children in England and 1695 of these are in Sussex (31st March 2019). This is an overall increase of 11% in 4 years.

Why do children enter care?

The child's parents might have agreed to this – for example, if their child has a disability and needs respite care. The child could be an unaccompanied asylum seeker, with no responsible adult to care for them. But the majority (63%) enter care because they have been abused or neglected.

What is the impact?

Looked after children are vulnerable to health inequalities, and exhibit significantly higher rates of:

- mental health issues
- emotional disorders (anxiety and depression),
- Hyperactivity and autistic spectrum disorder conditions.

Almost two-thirds of looked after children have special educational needs, are more likely to be excluded from school, and 5 times more likely to offend than the general population.

They are more likely to become a single parent and are at greater risk of teenage pregnancy and poor pregnancy-related outcomes such as smoking during pregnancy, having a low birth weight baby, and depression.

These experiences can leave children with complex emotional and mental health needs, which can increase their vulnerability to further abuse.

“Sometimes people think children in care are different. But that’s wrong. Everyone deserves to be listened to.” - Young person in care

Children and young people in care, and those with safeguarding concerns, remain some of the most vulnerable in our society. Yet not all get the help they need when and where they need it' (CQC 2016)

Corporate parenting responsibilities

Local authorities have a unique responsibility to the children they look after and their care leavers (relevant and former relevant children). In this context local authorities are often referred to as being the 'corporate parent' of these children and young people, and the critical question that local authorities should ask in adopting such an approach is: 'would this be good enough for my child?'

NHS contribution

The contribution of the NHS is crucial to ensuring the local authority fulfil their responsibilities of corporate parenting. The NHS contributes to meeting the health needs of looked-after children in three ways: commissioning effective services, delivering through provider organisations, and through individual practitioners providing coordinated care for each child.

Initial health assessments

The initial health assessment should result in a health plan, which is available in time for the first statutory review by the Independent Reviewing Officer (IRO) of the child's care plan. That case review must happen within 20 working days from when the child started to be looked after

Review health assessments

The review of the child's health plan must happen at least once every six months before a child's fifth birthday and at least once every 12 months after the child's fifth birthday. The child's social worker and IRO have a role to play in monitoring the implementation of the health plan, as part of the child's wider care plan.


6.0 Pan Sussex Child Death Review Team

9.0 Continuing Healthcare

NHS Continuing Healthcare (CHC) is the name given to a package of care which is arranged and funded by the NHS for people outside of hospital with complex ongoing primary health needs. This is assessed by looking at all their care needs and relating them to four key indicators (nature, complexity, intensity and unpredictability).

CHC is provided to adults; Continuing Care is provided to children and young people. It is not dependent on having a particular diagnosis, disease or condition. CHC is provided in any setting, including the home or in a nursing/care home setting as long as the patient meets the national criteria and is registered to a Sussex GP.

Professionals involved with the individual's care, for example the nursing home manager or community nurse may complete the initial referral known as a "checklist" and supply it to the CHC Team.

If the checklist triggers a full assessment of eligibility for CHC the CHC team will contact the referrer to arrange a date for a facilitated Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) Decision Support Tool (DST) Meeting. The GP may be invited to attend this meeting and in addition would need to provide the following information:

- GP summary
- Details of any interactions with the patient for the three months previous to the facilitated Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) Decision Support Tool (DST) Meeting
- Details of any information the GP feels may be relevant to the case
